Our Year 8 Curriculum

In Year 7, your son studied Old, Middle and Early-Modern English. This year, he will focus on texts from the 18th-21st Century. In the Autumn term, he will focus on the theme of Remembrance He will then explore Romantic, Gothic and Victorian Literature in the Spring term and Mitch Johnson's 'Kick' in the Summer term.

The Summer Term (April-July)

Year 8 continue their curriculum journey—having explored the Romantic era, the power of Gothic literature, and the investigatory world of Conan Doyle's 'Sherlock Holmes'. Pupils are now transported from the late nineteenth century to the twenty-first century with former pupil, Mitch Johnson's novel, 'Kick'. Having explored the turn of the twentieth Century with Morpurgo's 'Private Peaceful', we are jumping forward to a relevant, engaging, and widespread global text. 'Kick' tells the story of Budi, a child in Indonesia, who is football mad; it depicts the hardships of poverty, the challenges of inequality, and the power of corruption.

- 4. How can we productively and usefully challenge inequality and corruption in our world?
- 5. Describe life in Indonesia, and use your empathy skills to depict their challenges, realities, and fears.

Wider Reading and Research Opportunities

If your son is interested in learning more about the development of the English language and the sustained popularity of legends and adventure genre, we would recommend he takes a look on Moodle for a number of different wider reading opportunities. He could also visit the Library where we have a number of complementary texts!

Accelerated Reader

To complement his studies and support his reading, your son will be enrolled on the Accelerated Reader programme. Mrs Rutherford will contact you with further details of this program shortly. In order to support this programme, your son will have one lesson a week in the school library. We ask that you support your son by encouraging him to read, or reading with him, for at least 20 minutes every day. Reading every day supports academic progress as well as allowing students to develop their vocabulary, concentration, empathy, creativity and wellbeing.

Summer Reading Challenge

This summer, we are again having a Summer Reading Challenge! This is to support all pupils in continuing to read over the summer holidays, and to engage with a range of texts with the guidance of you at home, for rewards in school at the start of the next academic year. There are 12 challenges for pupils to engage with and when one is complete, please sign their box. When they return to school, they are encouraged to give their signed sheet to their English teacher who will aware 5 house points for every challenge they have completed... 60 house points up for grabs! We would be most grateful for your support with this reading initiative.
